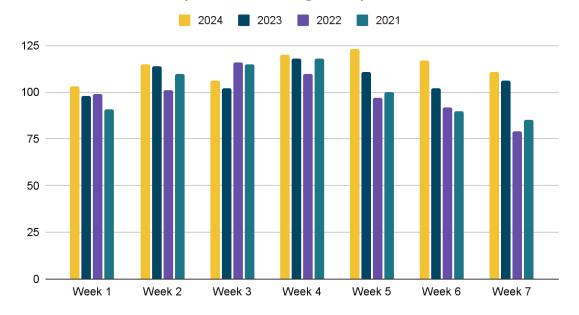
## Camp Salesian Report 2024

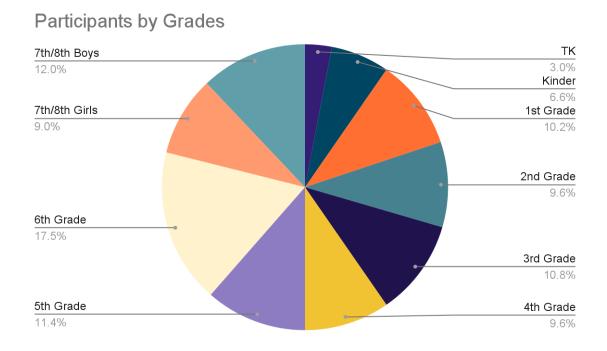
Note: based on our records on average 74% of families received financial aid assistance to attend our summer camp. This does not include the families that received a sibling discount.

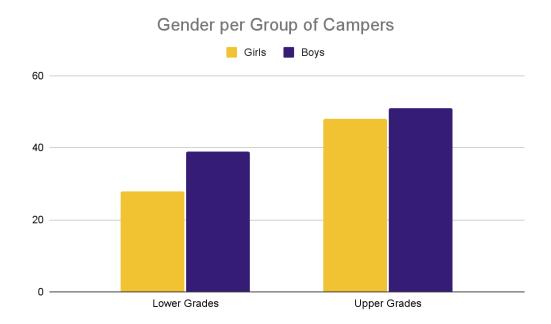

**Note:** Camp Salesian every year has a deficit, this year it would have been \$1,057.08 but thankfully with the support of our annual Gala Fundraiser we made a revenue this year. # **Additional Information About Our Campers**

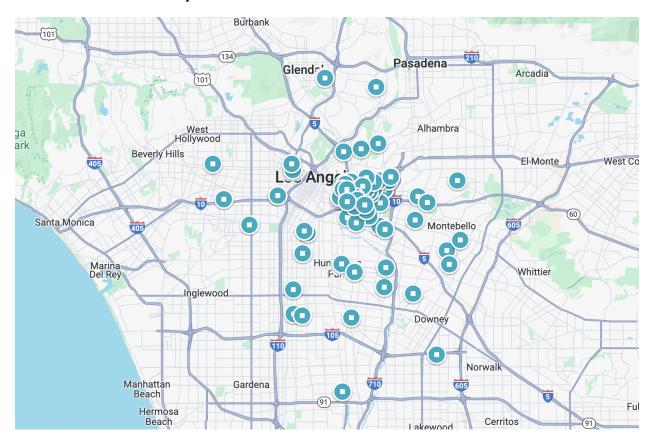


**Note:** Upper Grades (4th-8th grades) were 59.6% of our participants this year with the lower grades making up the 40.3% left over. The largest grade this year was 6th grade with 29 registered campers and totaling 17.5% of our participants in our camp.



**Note:** For lower grades (TK-3rd grade) the numbers between genders had a larger gap compared to the one for upper grades (4th-8th grade). The larger number of campers in upper grades reflects how 6th grade was the largest grade this camp season.

## Locations where the campers come from:



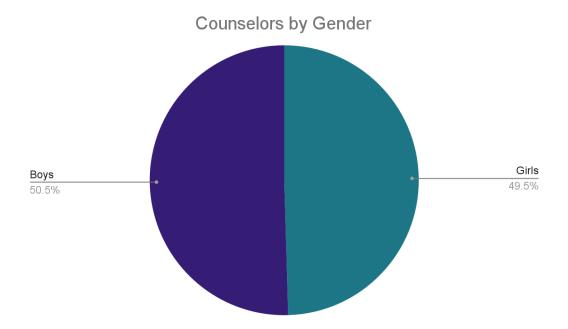
### Notes:

- There are a handful of families that bring their children from cities over as far as the Gardena area showing that parents like the program that they wouldn't mind the commute.

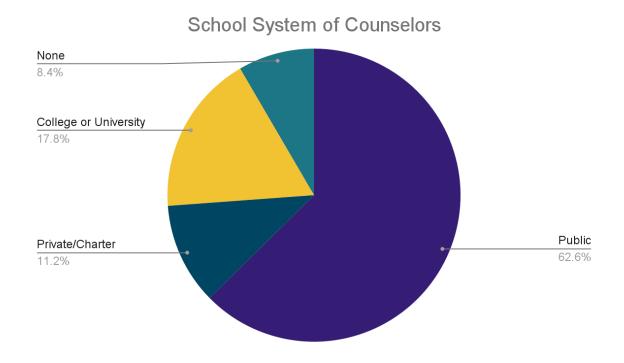
### **Counselors Data**

Counselors are the young people who volunteered at the club. These young people do not get paid for their commitment.

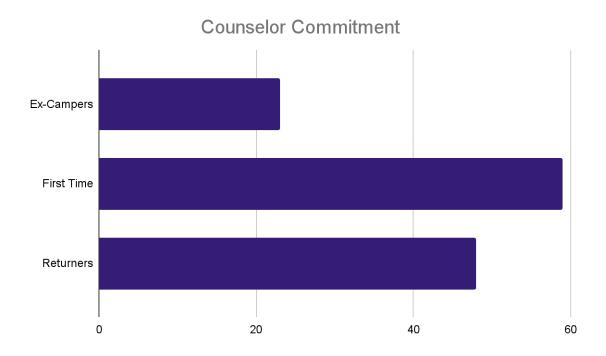
- 1. Total Number of Counselors attending camp: 97 volunteers.
- 2. We had 10 staff overseeing the camp totalling staff & volunteers at 107.
- 3. We had 54 male volunteers and 53 female volunteers.



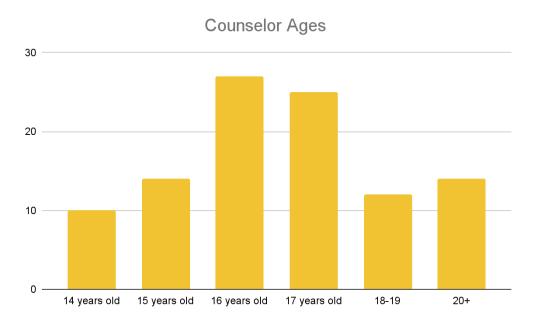
**Note:** Our counselors this year saw more even numbers! Our volunteers were almost exactly the same in regards to gender.



**Note:** The majority of our counselors come from the public school system with the majority coming from our neighboring Roosevelt High School. The next amount we have is college students that make up 26.6%.



**Note**: We had a retention of 48 counselors this year, which made up about 45% of our counselors. This year we had a huge jump in the number of first time counselors showing how awesome our camp is viewed in the community and that we are advertising great!



**Note:** Our largest number of volunteers are 16-17 years old showing the commitment is strong with sophomores and juniors in high school.
